

"The Parable of an Angry Heart"

Jonah 4:1-11

Main Passage

Jonah 4:1-11 (ESV) – ¹ But it displeased Jonah exceedingly, and he was angry. ² And he prayed to the LORD and said, "O LORD, is not this what I said when I was yet in my country? That is why I made haste to flee to Tarshish; for I knew that you are a gracious God and merciful, slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love, and relenting from disaster. ³ Therefore now, O LORD, please take my life from me, for it is better for me to die than to live." ⁴ And the LORD said, "Do you do well to be angry?"

⁵ Jonah went out of the city and sat to the east of the city and made a booth for himself there. He sat under it in the shade, till he should see what would become of the city. ⁶ Now the LORD God appointed a plant and made it come up over Jonah, that it might be a shade over his head, to save him from his discomfort. Big Idea – Anger Never Satisfies the Soul But Love for Lord Brings Prevailing Peace

Three Lessons Learned from an Angry Heart

Lesson #1 – The R<u>eason</u> for Anger: A Heart of R<u>esentment</u> is Always D<u>ispleased</u> and D<u>issatisfied</u>

Jonah 4:1-4 (ESV) – ¹ But it displeased Jonah exceedingly, and he was angry. ² And he prayed to the LORD and said, "O LORD, is not this what I said when I was yet in my country? Lesson #2 – The Result of Anger: A Heart Dominated by Anger Always Displaces the Presence Peace and Joy

Lesson #3 – The R<u>uin</u> of Anger: A Life D<u>efined</u> by Anger is a Life D<u>ominated</u> by Disaster and Destruction

Jonah 4:10-11 (ESV) – ¹⁰ And the LORD said, "You pity the plant, for which you did not labor, nor did you make it grow, which came into being in a night and perished in a night. ¹¹ And should not I pity Nineveh, that great city, in which there are more than 120,000 persons who do not know their right hand from their left, and also much cattle?"

Memory Verse

James 1:19-20 (ESV) – ¹⁹ Know this, my beloved brothers: let every person be quick to hear, slow to speak, slow to anger; ²⁰ for the anger of man does not produce the righteousness of God. ²¹ Therefore put away all filthiness and rampant wickedness and receive with meekness the implanted word, which is able to save your souls.
